

Archaeobotany to Zooarchaeology

This course explores how archaeologists have investigated human-animal and human-plant relationships in the past, focusing in particular on the role of zooarchaeological and archaeobotanical evidence, but also showing how material culture and landscape evidence are increasingly being used to provide a more holistic view.

Practical experience will be gained in the analysis and interpretation of archaeozoological and archaeobotanical data and in the production of reports to professional standards.

Specific aims are to:

- Provide experience and in-depth understanding of the practical and interpretative issues concerning the identification and analysis of bioarchaeological data.
- Provide identification skills in zooarchaeology and archaeobotany.
- Develop critical skills in assessing published literature and presentation skills.
- Develop professional skills in the analysis and dissemination of bioarchaeological data.
